How many teeth do dolphins have?

There are dolphins with 8 teeth and there are some with 250. They only get one set of teeth for life. Dolphins do not use their teeth to chew their food like us. They use their teeth to catch their food and then they swallow it whole.

WHERE IN THE WORLD ...

The Netherlands is a country in northwestern Europe, and it is known for its flat, beautiful landscape, canals, tulip fields, windmills, chocolatey breakfasts and cycling routes.

There is a lot of confusion about the name of the country. The Netherlands is made up of 12 'provinces' including 'Zeeland', 'Utrecht', 'Noord (north) Holland' and 'Zuid (south) Holland'. (In the UK we have a similar thing, the UK is made up of 4 'countries; England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.)

Some random facts...

TULIPS

You will see tulips in the shops now, most of them will have been grown in The Netherlands. The tulip farms are in the provinces of 'Flevoland' and Nord Holland'. The weather there is suited to tulip growing, with cool springs just as they begin to bloom. While tulips have been grown in the Netherlands for a very long time, they do not originate from the Netherlands. The first tulip bulbs were imported from Turkey to the Netherlands, where they proved to grow extremely well.

PEOPLE FROM THE NETHERLANDS ARE THE TALLEST IN THE WORLD

With an average height of 184 cm for men and 170 cm for women. Scientists say it's because of their DNA, nutrition and welfare, others say it's because they eat so much dairy food. The Netherlands produce over 150 types of cheese, including Edam, Gouda, Maasdam and Delft Blue. There are so many shops only selling cheese, and traditionally The Netherlands host cheese markets and cheese festivals.

AMSTERDAM IS BUILT ENTIRELY ON POLES

Because Amsterdam's soil consists of a thick layer of fen and clay, all buildings are built on wooden poles that are fixed in a sandy layer that is 11 meters deep on average. The Royal Palace at Dam Square is built on 13,659 wooden poles!

CLOGS

Clogs are shoes made from wood. Traditional clogs remain in use as protective footware in agriculture and in some factories and mines. Clogs are also used in several different styles of dance. When worn for dancing an important feature is the sound of the clog against the floor.
