Dear Parents

Welcome back after the Christmas break. We hope you all had a wonderful Christmas and are ready for another busy term.

We would like to thank you all for supporting our attendance policy. As you know one of the reasons we were graded Requires Improvement by Ofsted in the last inspection was because our attendance had dropped to 94%. For the academic year 2016-17 we achieved 95.9% in line with the national average of 96% and are currently running at 96.5%. Only six children, in the whole school, are on the persistent absentee register with attendance less that 90%. This increase in attendance just shows how happy children are at Belford First School and how engaged they are in their learning.

For the last two years our end of year data in early years, year 1 and year 2 has exceeded national expectations. Last year Belford First School was in the top 10% of schools across the country for writing and maths. We are very proud of the progress we have made and look forward to Ofsted returning later this term where I'm sure they will be impressed by our achievements.

The high number of educational visits, visitors to school and projects such as numeracy in the workplace help us to provide a broad and balanced curriculum for all our children. Last year we did some amazing work with the Peregrini Landscape Partnership which was displayed in a workshop on Holy Island. This week we have visited the Aln Valley Railway, RNLI and Grace Darling museum, and next week we will visit The Sill Education Centre in Hexham. This year we want to further raise the children's aspirations by making links with local industry and linking the skills they learn now, in school, with those they will need in the future at work. Research tells us that when children see the bigger picture and have a 'dream' there is more chance of achieving the unachievable.

As you know the statutory consultation to become a Primary School ended on Friday and the decision on whether we can become a primary school will be made by Northumberland County Council early in February. Once that decision is made we hopefully will be able to plan for September by holding a meeting to hear your views and listen to your expectations for a Primary School.
